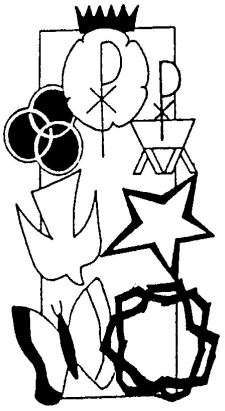

FROM THE
PASTOR

Have you ever used laundry detergent, stain remover or bleach? Perhaps your clothes got very dirty and you took your clothes to the laundry room for a special treatment like a stain remover or bleach. In the story of the Transfiguration of our Lord found in Mark 9: 2-3, it says, "Jesus was transfigured before them, and his clothes became radiant, intensely white, as no one on earth could bleach them."

This lesson describes the transfiguration of Jesus. It is a special time in the Church Year. For the past weeks, we have been in the Epiphany season where we have seen the glory and power of Jesus. This event brings us to the glorious end of the season. Jesus is on a high mountain with disciples Peter, James and John. The disciples are blessed to see that Jesus was indeed the Son of God. In that setting, God the Father again speaks: "This is my beloved Son."

Words cannot describe what happened and what Jesus looked like. Mark's Gospel again shares that Jesus' appearance was brighter and cleaner than and bleach. Jesus was the perfect, holy Son of God. There was no mark of dirt or sin.

Many times, our clothes are dirty and are in need of cleaning. We are covered with the dirt and stains of our sin. Jesus, who was transfigured on the mountain, would go down from the mountain and proceed to the cross. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, we begin to follow Jesus on His journey as we start the Lent season of the Church Year.

The Son of God, who was transfigured, would Himself be covered with bruises and scars in His Passion so that we might receive His brightness. Jesus' journey to the cross makes us clean from sin.

PRAYER: Jesus, we can't imagine what it was like to see Your glory on the mountain. Because You went from the Mount of Transfiguration to the Mount of Calvary, all who believe in You will see Your glory in eternity. Thank You for covering us in the white robes of Your righteousness as we wait for Your coming. Amen.

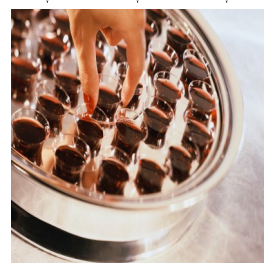
If Henry County is in a Level 2 or 3 snow emergency, all activities, meetings, and services are cancelled at St. Paul Lutheran Church, Liberty Center.

FROM THE BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

LCMS Health Ministry

January is usually the month when people devote themselves to forming new habits or revisiting old ones that have gone by the wayside during the busyness of the holiday season. But New Year's resolutions, if we're being honest with ourselves, rarely get "resolved" with the start of a new year. By February, it's easy to lose our zeal. That's because we are prone to have a "sprint" mentality when the reality is that the Christian life is more akin to a long-distance race. Paul says this in Philippians 3:14: "I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus." Godliness is waking up every day remembering your baptism and walking throughout the day in baptismal grace. Godliness is self-control of body and discipline of spirit for the sake of God's name and for the good of neighbor. Godliness is having hope in the life to come while living faithfully and joyfully in the life we live now. Follow the ways and rhythms that Christ has set for His people in worship, in prayer, in community, in feasting and celebrating, and your year will be filled with the richness of Christ's good gifts. LCMS Stewardship The Forgotten Stewardship Tool

Luther's Small Catechism is a magnificent tool. Joined with a well-used copy of the Holy Scriptures and an orthodox hymnal, and the Christian is well equipped to live a life of faithfulness to the Lord and service to the neighbor. First in German and now in English and just about any language known to man, this handy masterpiece has introduced generations of people to the central doctrine of justification by grace, through faith, on account of Jesus Christ. The Six Chief Parts have proven to be a faithful framework for a clear confession of the truth of the Gospel for nearly five hundred years!

But more than a textbook, the Small Catechism also serves well as a handbook for Christian living. As a part of its treasure, there is an element that teaches an extraordinarily strong message of stewardship. That hidden treasure that needs to be rediscovered is called the Table of Duties.

The Table of Duties is really nothing more than a categorized gathering of Bible verses. These verses are set apart for "various holy orders and positions, admonishing them about their duties and responsibilities." Addressing pastors and people, government and citizens, husbands, wives, children, youth, workers and so many more, it very clearly lays out what faithful stewardship looks like. Even better, these assembled passages teach one important truth: we are stewards of one another!

The Table is much more than a "how-to" tool; it also lays out the interconnectedness that exists within the body of Christ. Pastors are described by what they are to be as stewards of the Word. 1 Timothy 3 highlights the characteristics of a faithful pastor. Even more, Titus 1 highlights the need for the pastor to be faithful for the sake of those under his care.

Those who hear the faithful preaching of the pastor are stewards of the pastor as well. 1 Corinthians 9 talks about the need for the people to support the livelihood of the pastor. Galatians 6 talks about how the hearers share in the good things that the pastor teaches. 1 Timothy 6 talks about the honor that is owed to the pastor, not because of WHO he is, but rather WHAT he is teaching! Hebrews 13 shows the impact of this stewardship on the pastor, that they perform their duties with joy. Joyful pastors and people are always going to be better stewards of the Gospel!

Outside the church this interdependent stewardship is on display as well. Romans 13 highlights the respect necessary for the governing authorities. As citizens, the faithful steward is called to pay taxes (Matthew 22), pray for their leaders (1 Timothy 2) and that they should be ready to serve in the civil realm (Titus 3), because they are in these positions by God's direction (1 Peter 2).

These steward duties are in the home too! 1 Peter 3 and Colossians 3 shape the husband steward. Ephesians 5 and 1 Peter 3 shape the wife steward. Ephesians 6 form parental stewards and child stewards.

The Table of Duties is a wonderful place for the individual steward to learn how much our stewardship is more than just a "me and Jesus thing!" In fact, it ends with these words: "Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well share fare." This is interdependent stewardship on clear display. As each learns stewardship in this way, the more faithful we will be as a family, congregations, communities and the church at large.
